



Sad twist: elite employers draw hundreds of applications for each opening. Perhaps only 1% gets in







What's stressful about networking?

- * I don't know anyone important
- * Networking feels really awkward



Can we reframe? Most networking is simple; it's striking up conversations in everyday life

Getting started: your network is bigger than you realize

Anyone intrigued by your social media presence


What types of people are you trying to meet?

First: connectors and big-picture specialists. You'll enjoy them and they'll like you. They'll get you started.

Second: People at **the specific organizations** where you'd like to work.
They can help open doors

Third: Extra recommendations from people already in your network. "Who else should I be talking to?"

Why would busy people spend time with me?





Where might you want the conversation to go?

- Simplest case: I'd like to learn about career opportunities in your field. Can we chat a little?
- A variant: tell me your story of "How I got here."
- When they're ready: What ways I could join your organization?
- Could I shadow you for an afternoon on the job?
- Could you critique my work?
- Most ingenious ask: Could you come talk to our campus or alumni group?
